







Real GDP growth in Africa, 2009 - 2019








Real per capita GDP growth in Africa, 2009 - 2019




Formal vs. Informal Employment in Selected African Countries






Population Projections, 2015-2100












Social Progress 2014 - 2018: Ghana, Malawi and Kenya






Total jobs created by SDG business opportunities by region and system - In millions


